On 13 Feb. 1943, a call went out to women across America: "Be a Marine . . . Free a Man to Fight." Two months short of her 21st birthday (after receiving her parents' consent) the then Bernice Frankel, enlisted into the Marines on 20 Feb. 1943.

From 1944-1945 in WWII, Arthur worked as a driver and a dispatcher. She served until Sep. 1945. By discharge time, she had attained the rank of Staff Sergeant. Her discharge paperwork indicated a desire to pursue drama and the rest is history.

The beautiful outdoor venue and blue skies set the stage for a long-overdue memorial ceremony honoring PDC, Master Sergeant Bill McGowan.








McGowan had such overwhelming influence on Rev. Sheppard, that he credits McGowan with the strength to attain his ordainment.

SERVICE AUGUST 31, 2021 PDC DUANE FROST

A Service with Military Honors was held for Frost. His internment was on 1 Sept 2021. His final resting place is the Western New York National Cemetery in Pembroke. The family suggests donations to any veterans' charity to show sympathy.

Sgt. Duane Frost was born in Silver Creek and on 4 April 1949. As an adult, he settled in Niagara Falls and later passed at the age of 72 on 24 August 2021 at Buffalo General Medical Center.

Sgt. Frost proudly served 2 tours in the United States Marine Corps as a rifleman during the Vietnam War from 19 June 1968 until his honorable discharge on 16 June 1972.

As a 3-time Purple Heart recipient, Marine Frost was appropriately active in the Purple Heart Chapter #264 in Niagara Falls.

Frost was also life member of the Conrad F. Kania Marine Corps



League, Detachment #230, where he served as Past Commandant and more recently, was a member of the 2nd Lt. John Paul Bobo Marine Corps Detachment #1118. He was also a member of MODD #37. Before his passing he was the Commander and Life member of the American Legion John J. Welch Post #381 and Life Member of the VFW Post #54.

It's been said that Frost was a hero to all who knew him.










BIG WINNER!

NATIONAL ANNUAL NAVAJO CODE TALKERS DAY

On 14 August 2021, we again paid tribute to the Navajo who fearlessly contributed to the success of WWII. Between 375 and 420 Navajo men were recruited to be Code Talkers of the Marines, to serve in communications. By August of 1942 they were trained Marines and ready to commence on their adventure. Their language (Diné Bizaad) was a code that our enemies were unable to break as there were less than 28 people outside of their tribe who understood the language. Additional tribesmen joined the military, but it is the Code Talkers who created a legacy. Because



of their participation, they unknowingly created that legacy for the entire Navajo people for years to come. They assisted the United States Marines in every major operation involving Iwo Jima including battles in the Pacific. Their bravery was crucial to the outcome of the Allied Forces and victory in World War II.



Arizona was the first state to commemorate them and declared that 14 August as Arizona's Navajo Code Talkers Day celebrated annually. It wasn't until 1982 that former President Regan declared that the Navajo Code Talkers Day would be an annual national event, also held on 14 August.

May their priceless service forever be remembered. Thankfully the Code Talkers chose to assist the Allies in WWII. The outcome may have been different their selfless participation.

The Code Talkers had brought honor to themselves, their people, and the United States of America. Their service was given selflessly, honorably and with pride.

There are only 4 Code Talkers still alive, who represent all of their fellow Code Talkers.





MARINE SSGT JOHN STEFANOWICZ COMPETES AT 2020 OLYMPICS

It takes a extensive commitment, training with dedication to reach the level of an Olympic quality competitor. Staff Sgt. John Stefanowicz proved himself qualified by winning several matches in the states for Greco-Roman Wrestling. The 29 year-old Stefanowicz was the first U.S. Marine to wrestle in the Olympic games since 1992 and hopes to be the first American to medal in his sport since Beijing in 2008.

Stefanowicz is from a farming community in Hopewell,
Pennsylvania where he trained with his brother. He had no interest in college, so Stefanowicz gave up wrestling and joined the Marines where he reached rank of SSGT performing intelligence work.



In 2017 he began wrestling again, and progressed rapidly despite a substantial increase in height and weight.

After many successes, he was seeded fourth at the U.S. Olympic Team Trials as he and proceeded to beat every favored opponent. It was his strength that helped him to qualify for Tokyo.

Stefanowicz had become known over the past couple of years, for rallying at the end to defeat his opponents. Peyton Walsh, his fellow Marine from the national wrestling team, commented that,

'When the odds are stacked against him, he gets better... No matter how battered he is, he is not going to lose... That is what Marines do.' said Walsh.

Unfortunately, the rally tactic did not work this time against his Croatian opponent, Ivan Huklek, who had his own impressive wrestling resume. It was quite a surprise to many when the Marine was defeated in his opening match by the Croatian.

It takes a lot of grit and fortitude to qualify for the Olympic games and as a Marine, he definitely has that. Even though he did not medal, his presence at the Olympics is impressive in itself.



The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) announced it will re-adjudicate previously denied claims for Veterans who served in the offshore waters of the Republic of Vietnam during the Vietnam War. Veterans who were previously denied service connection for an herbicide related presumptive condition outside of in-country Vietnam service will automatically have their claims readjudicated. This will also apply to eligible survivors of deceased Vietnam era Veterans.
