

### WHAT IS THE MOMENT THAT MADE YOU THE MOST PROUD WHILE IN THE CORPS?

It all started when I graduated boot camp, getting selected for Marine Security Guard duty, and becoming a non-commission officer, and finally with the pinning of the blood stripes.

#### WHAT WAS YOUR MOST USEFUL LESSON?

Anything can be achieved if you set your mind to it and never give up.

### WHAT WAS THE MOST SURREAL EXPERIENCE YOU HAD WHEN YOU SERVED?

It was when I was in the 8<sup>th</sup> Marines when the platoon sergeant woke us up at 0300. We weren't told where we were going but had to prepare to go. Not knowing where we were going was the worst of it all, but as Marines, we trained for this. We was sent a boat where we were off the coast of Panama. We were to be on alert and to be ready. However, the alert status was downgraded and to an exercise called Solid Shield.

#### **WOULD YOU DO IT AGAIN?**

One hundred percent absolutely!

### **PROJECT PURPLE HEART**

The Marine Corps League supports Project Purple Heart. This ultimately instructs the DOD to maintain a database of those with certain awards of valor, and a recipients of a Purple Heart.

2022 is the 240<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the establishment of the Purple Heart. The MCL encourages all Detachments to participate in the 240<sup>th</sup> anniversary observances on 11 November, and requests a Color Guard to participate in ceremonies across the country. An additional layer of respect is requested by shining either red-white -blue, or purple lights in the evening. The goal is to bring as much attention as possible to the Military Order of the Purple Heart and their recipients.

#### **PACT ACT PASSED**

There is exciting news to share! The PACT Act has passed through Congress, and Secretary McDonough has released the following statement:



"Veterans who were exposed to toxic fumes while fighting for our country are American heroes, and they deserve world-class care and benefits for their selfless service. The bipartisan PACT Act will help VA deliver for those Veterans—and their survivors — by empowering us to presumptively provide care and benefits to Vets suffering from more than 20 toxic exposure-related conditions.

"To those Veterans, their families, caregivers, and survivors: you can apply for PACT Act benefits by filing a claim at VA, and you can learn more about the PACT ACT at <a href="https://va.gov/pact">https://va.gov/pact</a> or by calling us at 1-800-MyVA411. We'll be communicating with you every step of the way to make sure that you and your loved ones get the benefits you've earned.

Please share this with your constituents and key stakeholders, and share widely that VA is considering all presumptive conditions established by the PACT Act to be presumptive on the date of enactment, and we encourage all Veterans and survivors who believe they may be entitled to apply now for VA health care and benefits.

### **CEREMONIAL RIFLES & STATIC DISPLAYS**

NOTICE TO ALL DETACHMENTS WITH U.S. ARMY TACOM RIFLES.

#### EVERY MARINE IS A RIFLEMAN FIRST.

During your time in the CORPS, it was expected that you be responsible to care for, secure, and be accountable for weapons assigned to you. The same expectation applies to weapons assigned to Detachment too. Remember,

Once a Marine, Always a Marine.

While at the National Convention in Daytona, Commandant Arcuri and Sr. Vice Commandant Dean Lawton Sr., had the opportunity to speak Ms. Jaime Albers, the Donations Chief at TACOM.



#### **TACOM**

United States Army

Tank Automotive and Armaments Command

Ms. Albers has good news for those Detachments that have rifles on loan from TACOM. The (re)certification of ceremonial rifles has moved to an on-line process making it so much easier. Using this new process, simplifies the process dramatically, and improves accuracy

TACOM has been trying to reach the Detachments that have rifle inventories on file to update their information. The Department (DoNY) will cooperate completely. Many items have been on loan since the 1960s or earlier, and it is time to move their records away from paper to electronic records.



DoNY has provided the requested email addresses. So, if you receive an email from TACOM, consider it urgent and use the link and code that they provide to begin the process. There is only 30 days to comply, so please do not procrastinate. For your convenience some identifying information fields will auto-populate with the information that TACOM has. It is important to only certify the rifle certifications that are in your possession. If there are discrepancy issues, they must be addressed.

Currently, records indicate that there are approximately 27 Detachments that have rifles on loan, and now static displays. A static display is a condemned /obsolete combat asset that has undergone a limited demilitarization process.

The program has 70,000 rifles, 27,000 customers, and only 15 people to manage it, so please exercise patience.

As a reminder, these items are the property of the United States Government and are on loan.

Please be aware that The Department requires notification when a Detachment adds or removes rifles, via loss, surrendered, or theft. Notice: If any rifle is lost or stolen, the Detachment must file a police report, and submit it to TACOM within 24 hours of the discovery. The Department also requires a copy of the report. These steps protect all parties involved if it were discovered that the weapon was used illegally.

This undertaking will require organized cooperation from all involved. Once the information is entered, verification process will be much easier to maintain than the present paper process. Success hinges on complete cooperation . If your Detachment no longer needs those objects, please contact TACOM and arrange to have them returned.

STATIC DISPLAYS MUST BE RECERTIFIED EVERY YEAR!

The Department Adjutant, Steve Topilnycky has been tasked by Commandant Arcuri to liaison with a TACOM donation specialist to get all Department of New York Detachments current with certifications.

Ceremonial Rifle Certifications are due every three years.

Please note that only a Detachment in good standing, is eligible to receive a loan of these items. To remain eligible it is imperative that Detachments cooperate during the audit and afterwards. Eligibility requires the reporting of rifles every 3 years, and static displays annually.

On a final note, if a Detachment has TACOM rifles, blank ammunition can be requested through the Army's Joint Munitions Command (JMC)

# THINK TWICE BEFORE ACCEPTING PAYOUTS FROM CAMP LEJEUNE TOXIC WATER LAWSUITS

Don't expect quick payouts from the Camp Lejeune toxic water lawsuits. If you go down the lawsuit road, be prepared for unexpected consequences.

The TV ads and colorful mailers have been relentless in recent months: "If you or someone you love served at Marine Corps Base Camp Lejeune prior to 1988, you may be eligible for financial compensation!" Don't get pulled into this seemingly free money exploit before doing your research.

Advocates are warning that tens of thousands of individuals who lived at the North Carolina base will never see a penny from a new law allowing civil suits against the military for water contamination injuries received there.

Those who do get payouts probably won't see any money for months, if not years.

Shane Liermann, deputy national legislative director at Disabled American Veterans, said, "Veterans need to make sure they're well informed before they make any decisions about getting involved with these lawsuits, because it could actually cost them money."

"The last thing we want is for our veterans to see a reduction in their benefits."

is committed to reducing the sad statistic of 22 veterans and active duty personnel commit suicide every single day.

#### THE GOAL IS ZERO!

The civilian community is not immune to this issue either and many of our veterans or their families have personally experienced suicide or suicide attempts within their own family.

In 2021, the fund raiser was inhibited by Covid, but in 2022 the detachment partnered with American Legion Post 256 of Canandaigua to continue the Challenge 22 program. Since


Covid had subsided, they set an ambitious goal of \$22,000 for this event.

The plan was to host an event with a 2.6 mile walk, food & beer trucks,

and music. Four charities chosen as the beneficiaries were Equicenter, Warrior Salute, The Marine Corps Coordinating Council and the Veterans Administration Medical Center at Canandaigua. Their mission was advertised there.



The area sponsors received a very popular, additional advertising by receiving a spot on the event T-shirt.

The MCL and American Legion were confident that the monetary goal, and bringing light to the daily suicides and available resources, would be met.

When all was said and done, the glass ceiling goal was shattered because

they raised over \$50,000! The four charities split the proceeds equally, and enjoyed a free lunch as well.

Expectations for next year's event is high and they have hopes of including other service organizations too.

Ultimately the goal is to eliminate the 22 suicides per day to **ZERO**, and the funds raised will help reach that goal.



## MILITARY SERVICE and SOCIAL SECURITY

Earnings for active duty military service or active duty training have been covered under Social Security since 1957.

If you served in the military before 1957, you didn't pay Social Security taxes, but we gave you special credit for some of your service.

You can get both Social Security benefits and military retirement benefits.
Generally, there is no reduction of Social Security benefits because of your military retirement benefits. You'll get your Social Security benefit based on your earnings and the age you choose to start receiving benefits.

#### Social Security and Medicare taxes

While you're in military service, you pay Social Security taxes, just as civilian employees do. You currently pay a 6.2% Social Security tax on up to \$147,000 of your earnings. The Medicare tax rate is 1.45% on all wages. High-income earners pay an additional 0.9% on earnings above certain amounts.

#### How your work qualifies you for Social Security

To qualify for benefits, you must earn credits by working and paying Social Security taxes. The number of credits you need to qualify depends on

your age and the type of benefit for which you're eligible. In 2022, you receive one credit for each \$1,510 of earnings, up to the max. of four credits per year. The amount of earnings needed to get credit for your work goes up each year. No one needs more than 10 years of work, or 40 credits.

#### **Extra earnings**

Your Social Security benefit depends on your earnings, averaged over your working lifetime. Generally, the higher your earnings, the higher your benefit. Under certain circumstances, special

earnings can be credited to your military pay record for Social Security purposes.

The extra earnings are for periods of active duty or active duty for training. These extra earnings may help you qualify for Social Security or increase the amount of your Social Security benefit.

If you served in the military after 1956, you paid Social Security taxes on those earnings. Since 1988, inactive duty service in the armed forces reserves (such as weekend drills) has also been covered by us.

- From 1957 through 1967, we will add the extra credits to your record when you apply for Social Security benefits.
- From 1968 through 2001, you don't need to do anything to receive these extra credits.

  The credits were automatically added to your record.
- After 2001, there are no special extra earnings credits for military service.
- The information that follows explains how you can get credit for special extra earnings. This applies only to active duty military service earnings from 1957 2001.


From 1957 - 1977, you're credited with \$300 in additional earnings for each calendar quarter in which you received active duty basic pay.

From 1978 - 2001, for every \$300 in active duty basic pay, you're credited with an additional \$100 in earnings up to a maximum of \$1,200 a

year. If you enlisted after September 7,

**1980**, and didn't complete at least 24 months of active duty or your full tour, you may not be able to receive the additional earnings. Check with us for details.

**1956**, you didn't pay Social Security taxes, but we gave you special credit for some of your service.





### VIETNAM WAR STORIES HONORING THE HEROES WE LOST: SECOND LIEUTENANT JOHN BOBO OF NIAGARA FALLS NY



AS WEAPONS PLATOON COMMANDER, COMPANY I, 3D BATTALION, 9TH MARINES, JOHN BOBO WAS POSTHUMOUSLY AWARDED THE MEDAL OF HONOR FOR HIS ACTIONS IN QUANG TRI PROVINCE ON MARCH 30, 1967.

#### Second Lieutenant John Bobo's Medal of Honor Citation reads as follows:

The President of the United States of America, in the name of Congress, takes pride in presenting the Medal of Honor (Posthumously) to Second Lieutenant John Paul Bobo, United States Marine Corps Reserve, for conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty on 30 March 1967, while serving with the Company I, Third Battalion, Ninth Marines, THIRD Marine Division (Reinforced), Fleet Marine Force in Quang Tri Province, Republic of Vietnam. Company I was establishing night ambush sites when the

command group was attacked by a reinforced North
Vietnamese company supported by heavy automatic
weapons and mortar fire. Second Lieutenant Bobo
immediately organized a hasty defense and moved from
position to position encouraging the outnumbered
Marines despite the murderous enemy fire. Recovering a
rocket launcher from among the friendly casualties, he
organized a new launcher team and directed its fire into
the enemy machinegun positions. When an exploding

enemy mortar round injured Bobo's right leg below the knee, he refused to be evacuated and insisted upon being placed in a firing position to cover the movement of the command group to a better location. With a web belt around his leg serving as a tourniquet, he remained in this position and delivered devastating fire into the ranks of the enemy attempting to overrun the Marines. Second Lieutenant Bobo was mortally wounded while firing his weapon into the main point of the enemy attack but his valiant spirit inspired his men to heroic efforts, and his tenacious stand enabled the command group to gain a protective position where it repulsed the enemy onslaught.

Second Lieutenant John Bobo was
24 years old at the time of his passing.
He lies in rest at Gate of Heaven Cemetery
in Lewiston, New York.



#### **LEWIS BURWELL PULLER**

June 26, 1898 - October 11, 1971



LtGen Puller, better known as "Chesty" of the United States Marine Corps, fought guerrillas in Haiti and Nicaragua early in his military career.

He later served with distinction in World War II and the Korean War.

Puller is one of the most decorated Marines in American history. He is one of just two U.S. servicemen awarded five Navy Crosses and one Army Distinguished Service Cross.

After 37 years of service, Chesty retired from the Corps in 1955.

He lived until age 73 and passed in 1971.

Her military career includes more than 2,500 flight hours in 25 types of aircraft.
